



“My Lord and My God”

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Divine Mercy Sunday is a special day of thanksgiving for the immense goodness and mercy that God has shown us throughout the Easter mystery. God revealed his mercy most profoundly through the gift of his only-begotten Son, Jesus, whose suffering, death, and resurrection bring us salvation. Divine mercy is also extended to us in every celebration of the sacraments.

On this Divine Mercy Sunday, the Gospel passage illustrates how Jesus showed his mercy to the doubting apostle Thomas, emphasizing the importance of faith. When Jesus first appeared to the disciples, Thomas was absent. The other disciples told him, “We have seen the Lord.” But Thomas replied, “Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nail marks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe.”

A week later, Jesus appeared to the disciples again, offering Thomas the opportunity to see and touch his wounds. In that moment, Thomas heard Jesus’ voice calling him to let go of his doubts and trust. Overcome with faith, Thomas made his famous proclamation: “My Lord and my God,” a prayer of both acknowledgment and adoration. Jesus responded, “Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed.” This speaks to all of us who believe without seeing. We are the blessed ones who, though we do not see, believe.

We’ve all had our own “doubting Thomas” moments. What is your “unless”? “Unless Jesus removes this difficulty, fixes my finances, heals my loved one, eases my anxiety, or slows my aging, I will not believe.” In moments of struggle, we may find it hard to rely on the witness of others to hold us steady in the truth. Jesus invites us in these times to come closer, to lay aside our doubts and fears, and trust in his grace and mercy. He calls us to surrender our lives to him, the Lord of mercy.

Through the sacraments, especially the Eucharist and Reconciliation, we are invited to receive God’s mercy. Living faith helps us see the Risen Lord in everyone and empowers us to serve others—especially the sick, the weak, the oppressed, and the poor. We are called to recognize that our Lord continuously loves us, forgives our doubts, strengthens our faith, and reveals himself to us through his Church. Let us thank the Lord for his mercy and love, which renew and sustain us.

First Holy Communion: This weekend is also special for us as ten children are receiving their First Holy Communion. We pray for them, that they may continue to grow in faith and bear witness to Christ through their lives. May they experience the fullness of God's mercy and love as they encounter Jesus in the Eucharist for the first time.

The Chaplet of the Divine Mercy:

Our Father...., Hail Mary..., the Apostles Creed.

On Our Father beads: *Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.*

On the Hail Mary beads: *For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.*

In Conclusion: *Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world. (3 times).*

Rosary Intention: *For all the children celebrating the Sacrament of 1st Holy Communion*



2nd Sunday of Easter



It's common for Catholics to hear the question, "Why do I have to go to a priest to have my sins forgiven?" I've never liked that question because not only is it clunky (confession is the ordinary way for the pardoning of serious sins, not lesser ones). But it misses the larger context: the wonderful origins of the sacrament itself. And this context is deeply Jewish.

Ancient Jews associated forgiveness of sins with priests offering sacrifices in the Jerusalem temple. It was a solemn, public, and tangible way to access God's mercy. So when the risen Jesus breathes on the Apostles and says, "**Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained**" (John 20:23), the upshot is remarkable: he is the new temple and his Apostles are the new priests. Jerusalem is no longer the place to find forgiveness from sin. Jesus' body, the Church, is.

So why should we go to the Sacrament of Confession? For the same reason ancient Jews went to the temple in Jerusalem: to experience the intimacy, joy, and life-giving power of God's eternal forgiveness.
